#### ST. SIMEON'S ANGLICAN CHURCH Annual Vestry Meeting Year 2018 February 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2019

- In attendance: The Reverend Nick Brotherwood, plus those on the attached signed attendance list, making a total of 21.
- Welcome and Appointment of the Vestry Clerk: Rev. Nick Brotherwood welcomed those in attendance for St. Simeon's Annual General/Vestry meeting. Karen Napp was nominated as Vestry Clerk, seconded by Joan & Herb. All in favour.
- 2. **Opening Prayer:** Rev. Nick B. opened the meeting with a prayer.
- **3.** <u>Adoption of the Agenda</u>: Rev. Nick moved that the agenda be approved: seconded by Judy and Ann. All in favour. Motion carried.
- Minutes of the last Annual General Vestry Meeting: Approval of minutes from February 25<sup>th</sup>, 2018 for Year 2017. Moved by Karen to accept; seconded by Edna and Joan. All in favour. Motion carried.
  - **4.1 Business arising:** No business arising from the minutes.

On screen, Susan presented an "In Memoriam" remembering past members of St. Simeon's congregation, including Winnie Napp, Shelby-Lee Teresiuk, Jim Campbell, Shirley Brown and Barbara Smith.

- 5. <u>Reports:</u> Rev. Nick B. was very impressed with all the group reports presented in the AGM booklet.
  - 5.1 Clergy Report: Copy attached and submitted by Rev. Josee Lemoine, Rev. Nick Brotherwood, and Rev. Deacon Tania Lesack, covering numerous topics of the Laurentian Regional Ministry including: Clergy and Lay Readers' Changes, the LRM 2018 Survey Report, LRM Joint Services, LRM Management Committee, Youth Ministry, and other important events and ministries.
  - **5.2 Laurentian Regional Ministry:** Report attached. Susan led us through the steps and action of the LRM over the past 3 years. She noted that after presentation of the survey report and executive report to Bishop Mary who gave her global approval of these reports, we now have procured permission from the Bishop to begin the process of hiring a full-time priest to replace Nick Pang. Before that we must update and revise our LRM profile. Susan was thanked by Rev. Nick B. for her very comprehensive report of the LRM. Question from the floor: Can we expect to engage an administrative assistant within the LRM? Susan responded that the LRM is not actively looking for such an assistant at the moment because of the extra expense to hire one, and we are not ready for that search yet until a priest is appointed.
  - **5.3 Rector's Warden:** Report attached. Susan's report can be found on Page 11 of the AGM booklet. Susan thanked Edna for preparing and producing this year's AGM booklet. Susan thanked Katie Heatlie for her fundraising initiative for St. Simeon's in memory of young Shelby Lee. Katie efficiently raised \$1100 for Shelby Lee's library to be constructed in the future at St. Simeon's. Rev. Nick thanked Susan for her patience and for being such an important source of information.
  - **5.4 People's Warden:** Report attached. Janick thanked Susan as Rector's Warden for her endless work within the LRM and as warden. Janick expressed thanks to Drummond for his help with the upkeep/maintenance of our buildings.
- 6. Treasurer's Report: Report attached. Herb presented the Treasurer's Report for 2018. Revenues at \$58 334, Expenses at \$62 359, for an Operating Deficit of \$4 025. Some questions from the floor were asked and answered/discussed by Herb. Thanks were expressed by Herb to Andy

for verifying the financial reports and to Grace in her role as envelope secretary. Andy thanked Herb for his tremendous work all year-long to keep financial records up to date and for producing annual reports.

### THROUGHOUT THE LRM

Each year brings its load of change and challenge for the churches and clergy team of the Laurentian Regional Ministry as we continue to discern how we are called to participate in God's mission in the world, to live out our Christian faith, and develop new ways to witness to the Good News of Jesus Christ in our daily lives.

The clergy team continues to serve 10 churches - 10 communities - in a wide geographic area. Among the challenges in the LRM is balancing the unity to which we are called as members of one body in Christ with the desire of individual churches to maintain their individuality, and the challenges to participation in regional ministry events posed by the distance people must travel in order to take part.

The LRM is blessed with a strong core of volunteers of lay members, retired clergy and supply clergy. We thank all who are involved in this ministry.

### **CLERGY TEAM**

On August 24<sup>th</sup>, Tania Lesack was ordained to the Priesthood at St. Simeon's in Lachute. She continues in her role as Assistant Curate of the LRM.

On September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2019, Nick Brotherwood, who had worked in the LRM part-time since July 2018, joined the team full-time and became Associated Priest of the LRM. At the same occasion, Josée Lemoine became Team Leader.

We are blessed to continue our ministries in the LRM.

#### **EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS**

The Alpha Course was run in the LRM, beginning in February and continuing through spring. The group met primarily at Trinity Morin Heights. The Alpha sessions were offered as part of confirmation preparation and included other participants. The candidates for confirmation ended their courses in June and were confirmed by Bishop Mary on October 27<sup>th</sup>.

A Worship Leaders' day was held in February on the subject of Mission. All lay readers and lay worship leaders of the LRM were invited to attend.

Lent study on the Gospel of Luke was offered in three locations (in the North, South and central LRM). The curriculum used was *Luke: A journey with Jesus,* produced by Montreal Diocesan Theological College.

An EFM - Education for Ministry group was started in September in Lachute.

The annual deanery Anglican Church Women (ACW) meeting was held at Grace Church on September 18<sup>th</sup> with a presentation on Human Trafficking by guest speaker Dwane Connors.

The Revive program began in Morin Heights in the Fall. A small group met on a weekly basis and completed the first module on exploring Christian prayer practices.

A study on the *Doctrine of Discovery: Stolen Lands, Strong Hearts* took place in Fall and Advent at Holy Trinity Church in Ste-Agathe.

### **IMPORTANT EVENTS AND MINISTRIES**

Ceilidhs were held in March and November in the Parish of the Lower Laurentians (PLL).

In March, a palm cross making party was organized at Wendy Nelles' house for the members of the Altar Guilds of both St-Sauveur and Morin Heights.

Members of St Simeon's and the LRM clergy are active in pastoral support to the seniors in care facilities in the Lachute throughout the year - clergy are part of the ecumenical team that leads worship services at La Residence and Le Pavilion.

In July, the Dunany annual golf tournament took place beginning with a worship service worship service at St Paul's; the annual PLL beach service took place also in July and this year the service included a baptism.

In August, the annual memorial service at Clark Cemetery in Ste-Agathe and the annual picnic at St-John-the-Baptist in Kilkenny were held.

The Grace Church annual picnic took place on Sunday September 15<sup>th</sup> in Arundel and on September 21<sup>st</sup>, a special service for the blessing of animals took place at Holy Trinity in Ste-Agathe.

In October the LRM welcomed Bishop James Almasi from Masasi, Tanzania at Holy Trinity Church in Ste Agathe; Bishop James addressed the gathered community celebrating *The Church is One Foundation*. The LRM welcomed Bishop Mary when she came to celebrate the confirmation of three young parishioners in Morin Heights.

In December the senior's dinner was held in Lachute.

Many fundraising activities took place In the LRM the region throughout the year

#### LRM JOINT SERVICES

Joint services, regional ministry events and ecumenical services build bonds of fellowship and community, responding to the call to live in mutual love and prayer.

A service of prayer for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was celebrated with the Roman Catholic and United churches at Grace Church in Arundel in January.

Joint services were held with the United Church in many parishes on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. As well there was a joint Easter Vigil service at St. Simeon's in Lachute and two Blue Christmas services on the shortest night in December in Lachute and Morin Heights.

As is customary, Trinity Morin Heights and St Francis of the Birds celebrated joint services on Trinity Sunday and the Feast of St. Francis in Morin Heights and in St-Sauveur, respectively.

In collaboration with local Legions in Arundel, Morin Heights and Lachute, the churches of the LRM participated in Remembrance Day ceremonies to honour and remember those who had fought and died in the wars of the past century. The churches of the LRM also participated in the remembrance celebrations in Ste-Agathe.

#### CHILDREN/YOUTH MINISTRY

Messy Church is an LRM - wide program started in December 2017. Messy Church continued to meet in the geographic middle of the region (Morin Heights) and in the south (Lakefield). This ministry, which was organized and led by Josée, Tania and Rev'd Joelle Leduc of the United church. The December gathering of Messy Church was cancelled due to a lack of volunteers, and a decision was made to bring the ministry to a close. A celebration of thanksgiving for the two years of this ministry will be held in January 2020.

St. Simeon's in Lachute has continued to hold their family service on the second Sunday of every month as they have in the past. This is a well-established, lay - led ministry.

#### **BAPTISMS, MARRIAGES AND FUNERALS**

Throughout the LRM, clergy welcomed new members into the family of Christ in baptism, blessed them as they made their covenant to each other before God in marriage, and gave thanks for the life of loved ones, in faith and hope through the victory of Christ over death in funeral in and interment services.

Nick officiated at one baptism and five funerals. Tania officiated at five funerals and one renewal of wedding vows. Josée officiated at ten funerals, thirteen burials, three baptisms, three marriages and one renewal of wedding vows throughout the LRM.

### LAURENTIAN REGIONAL MINISTRY COUNCIL ("LRM COUNCIL")

In 2019, Hugh Mitchell from the PLL, Mike Tott from Trinity in Morin Heights and John Richard from Holy Trinity in Ste-Agathe were reelected by their respective communities to be members of the LRM Council, and Audrey McDonough was elected for the first time at St. Francis in St-Sauveur.

The members of the LRM Council worked most of the year searching a full-time priest to join the LRM Clergy Team. They also identified, based on the workshops they lead and the report they wrote in 2018, the priorities they plan to work on in 2020. These priorities are: Pastoral Care, LRM Covenant and Shrinking Congregations/Small Groups).

#### **REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP**

The sponsorship of a new Syrian family, related to the family that was sponsored in 2017, was undertaken. Due to governmental limitations on the number of refugees who can enter in our province, this sponsorship is taken in collaboration with the Anglican Diocese of Ottawa and Refuge-Aide also based in Ottawa. The LRM involvement is mainly financial at this point in time and working in collaboration with the Sponsorship Group in Ottawa. We expect the family to come to Canada in 2020.

The clergy team very much looks forward to continuing ministry in the LRM; Josée as Priest and Team Leader of the LRM, Nick as Associate Priest of the LRM, and Tania as Assistant Curate in the LRM. A very big «thank you» to all those who lead Morning and Evening Prayer services, Bible Studies, family services, etc. and to the retired and active clergy who fill in our roster, without whom ministry in the LRM would look very different and incomplete!

### Laurentian Regional Ministry Council

The LRM Council consists of 8 representatives from the 10 different churches in the Laurentian Regional Ministry – along with the Ministry team of Rev'd. Josée Lemoine, Rev'd. Nick Brotherwood and Rev'd. Tania Lesack. The council meets once a month to discuss the concerns of the entire LRM and to explore ways to facilitate the ministry to all of the communities over this vast area. It has been challenging and it has been exciting, and it has been an honour for me to represent you over the past 5 years – since the inception of this regional ministry.

In 2019, we focussed our attention on finding a full-time priest to work in the LRM and, in September Nick was appointed as Associate Priest, working with Josée in her capacity as Team Leader. Tania, who had been ordained a Deacon the year before, was ordained a priest at a ceremony held in St. Simeon's in August of 2019. In the Fall, Josée prepared a document listing the responsibilities of each of the priests and this document was discussed and approved at our November meeting.

The housing arrangements for the three priests was worked out in collaboration with the Bishop's Office. Josée would remain in the Ste. Agathe Rectory and her housing allowance would be paid by the LRM Fair Share agreement to Holy Trinity for their expenses. Nick would be present at his cottage near Morin Heights 4 days a week and work the other days from his home in Montreal. He is paid a housing allowance by the LRM Fair Share agreement to cover his living expenses. Tania will continue to live in the rectory in Lachute and the Diocese will cover her housing allowance, sending the amount to St. Simeon's for the rental of the property. The housing allowance is set by the Diocese and was to the amount of \$14,313 per priest in 2019.

The Council also worked to develop a renewed Fair Share Agreement for the 7 parishes. (The PLL is considered as one Parish in this arrangement) The new calculations used the same criteria for each of the parishes to ensure that it was equitable. Our portion of the Fair Share rose to 17.6% in July of 2019 and it will be re-calculated each year for the 1<sup>st</sup> of July.

Since the beginning of September, we are blessed with three full-time priests who are devoted to creating opportunities for our individual parishes. One of the interesting projects this past Fall was to follow up the Survey answers of 2018. According to the workshops held in each of the churches, priorities were set, and of those priorities, we decided to work on the three most talked-about issues: Pastoral Care; the problem of Shrinking congregations; and the creation of a working Charter, or Covenant, between the congregations. We also spoke about issues such as Safe Church, which would require police checks of everyone in leadership roles in the churches. One of the other topics that keeps arising is the finance of the LRM and lots of ideas about addressing these important details are discussed and will continue to be discussed at our meetings.

One of the important practices at these monthly meetings is to hear about the many different activities and struggles and successes of our sister congregations. This presents us with a time to uphold each other and our priests.

It has been an honour to serve on this committee and I have had many opportunities to learn from this diverse group of men and women. My time of service has come to an end now and someone else is thankfully willing to take up the banner for St. Simeon's. The LRM Council is important to the future of our ministry and in this context; we have a voice to ensure our own destiny.

I thank you with my heart for your trust in me, for your encouragement, and for your love.

### Rector's Warden Report

I entered the doors of St. Simeon's as a naive, judgemental, yet curious young mother trying to figure out who God is and I can honestly say that 44 years later, I am less naive and less judgemental but still very curious. Trying to figure out who God is has turned out to be a quest that is never-ending. I have, however come to an understanding that gives me some peace: I love this Almighty God and I know that He loves me.

I have had the pleasure of wearing many hats and filling many roles over these past years. St. Simeon's has offered so much to me: Sunday school and Bible studies and women's groups and lots of teas and dinners, bazaars, plant, rummage and garage sales and innumerable gatherings. We have even had a successful theater group presenting 19 plays over the years, always under the creative genius of Garth and Janis and their imaginative team. It has been an eventful ride.

We are still a very active and vibrant church in 2020. Last year, we hosted the World Day of Prayer in March which was very well attended. We host a Pancake Supper every Shrove Tuesday and invite the public. We participate in bible study along with the PLL. We have a faithful group of people who pray for the concerns of the church each week. St. Simeon's has a wonderful choir and organist who faithfully lead the music for our weekly services. The Women's Fellowship work on various outreach programs and so many of our parishioners volunteer their time to take on all of the jobs that just need doing. And for the past 20 years and continuing on the second Sunday once a month, we benefit from the ministry provided by the Family service team - unique in this Diocese and still very successful. That is the kind of congregation we are kind, thoughtful, and caring; supportive and compassionate; creative, talented, productive and willing.

Each year that passes gives us opportunities to adapt to changing times. 2019 was no different. It started with a period of uncertainty, wondering where we were heading within the LRM. September, however offered us more stability and direction as Rev. Nick Brotherwood joined the Ministry team as a full-time associate priest and Rev. Tania Lesack was ordained priest at a service held in St. Simeon's. We have been fortunate to have her remain in the LRM as Assistant Curate. With three full time priests (Josée, Nick and Tania), we do not have to rely so heavily on our Lay leadership and we have the more consistent guidance of Nick as the priest responsible for the pastoral concerns of the southern part of the LRM. Tania continues to live in our rectory in Lachute, her rent being paid by the Diocese of Montreal.

In late October, we regretfully had to accept the resignation of Janick Tremblay-Bouchard as People's Warden. I am so thankful for all of his support to me personally and for the all of the good works he did for our church and our people. Since that time, our two Deputy wardens, Karen Napp and Edna Hall have stepped forward offering their expertise and support, continuing the ongoing work in St. Simeon's. Words do not adequately express my gratitude for their willingness to take on these extra responsibilities.

We are also so very blessed to have people like Drummond, who takes care of any work in our buildings; Karen who takes such good care of our Church; Herb who works tirelessly on our bookkeeping and so many others who work behind the scenes to ensure the ongoing ministry to the Anglican community in this area.

My experience as Rector's warden is similar to many of the other wardens of the past – we revolve in and out in these roles, each time bringing some new insights, and yet always learning new approaches and understandings. After 9 years of serving St. Simeon's as Rector's Warden, it is time for me to step down to allow others to spread their wings and lead us to new and exciting projects over the next few years.

Leaving a position does not mean leaving a community. I assure you that you are in good and capable hands and that I will be focussing on other aspects of ministry to you. I am so grateful for all your love and support over these past years. ### People's Warden Report

Maintenance Projects at St. Simeon's Church and Rectory 2019

Projects **completed** at the Rectory in 2019:

- 2 basement windows on the west side were replaced
- Electrical panel entrance was upgraded from 60A to 200A
- Electrical outlets were added, 1 in the kitchen, 1 in the basement
- Drain from washer to sink in the basement was unblocked

Projects **completed** at the Church in 2019:

- Motor on furnace was replaced
- Outside security light in the back-parking lot was repaired
- Rental agreement with Pub Sir John was signed, for the use of our back-parking lot during the winter months. The Pub is responsible for winter snow clearing and restoring the area to an acceptable condition in the spring
- Sewers were unblocked in August 2019, work performed from inside the church

Projects considered for the Rectory in 2020:

- Replace soffit at the front of the Rectory to eliminate painting
- Furnace needs cleaning and preventive maintenance

- Grounds (trees and shrubbery) around Rectory, especially back yard, need to be trimmed back.
- Replace 1 more basement window
- Small item repairs/replacements, example replace door handle between kitchen & garage, etc.

Projects **considered** for the Church in 2020:

- Replace light bulbs (6 to 9) in stained glass windows at the back of church
- Replace or clean ceiling fans in church
- New outside sign board structure currently being completed
- Replace flooring in ante room and choir room
- Clean carpeting in church hall
- Replace damaged tiles in kitchen floor
- Gas portion of furnace needs to be cleaned and preventive maintenance on hot water tank needs to be performed
- Repair or replace the west outside exit as the present cement structure is crumbling

Sincere thanks and gratitude are expressed to Drummond Hall for his expertise and manual labour skills in overseeing the good health of our buildings. Thanks are also expressed to the men who have worked hard on different projects that need tending to. A great team effort!


